Judaism Institute & Minority Child Workshop

This is the fifth year of Ha Lailah Chapter's Judaism Institute and the fourth year of the Minority Child Workshop. The workshop, offered to teachers for recertification credit, is a four session program designed to inform the teacher of ways of dealing with the diversity of minority students now found in Charlotte schools with an emphasis on the Jewish child. The workshop begins October 29 at the Staff Development center and continues for four consecutive Thursday.

The session held on November 12 is at Temple Israel and is the Judaism Institute which is also open to local ministers and Sunday school teachers, and all Charlotte -Mecklenburg teachers who have not participated in the Minority Child Workshop. The Minority Child Workshop is led by members of Ha Lailah and community leaders.

Through participation in the Judaism Institute and Minority Child Workshop, teachers become more aware of the different influences a Jewish child faces at home. It is hoped that one situation to be alleviated is a child not being excused from school for Rosh Hashonah and other major religious holidays.
