In September 1988, the research recipient of the Ostrow-Shapiro funded fellowship will be chosen by the Medical-Science Advisory Board of Juvenile Diabetes Foundation International and announced in various national publications along with other JDF funded research.

Charlotte Benefactors was started in 1984 by Roz Greenspon who in 1971 founded the Charlotte JDF chapter. When discussing the Ostrow-Shapiro gift, Mrs. Greenspon said. 



