

Luncheon Honors "Lions of Judah"



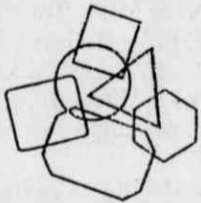

'A Case for Giving in '89'

Guest speaker for the afternoon was Rosanne Zinn of Atlanta, Georgia, who is a member of the National UJA Women's Division Board and a leader in the Atlanta Jewish community. She is also a "Lion of Judah." Ms. Zinn spoke on "A Case for Giving in '89."

Rosanne serves on the Atlanta Jewish Federation Board of Trustees, holding a position on the Allocations Committee; is chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee on Day School Allocations, is a V.P. of the Federated Women's Council and is on the Executive Committee of the Zachor Holocaust Resource Center. For the past two years she chaired the Legacy Division for Major Gifts of the Women's Division Campaign and was Missions Chairman for Region III.

Currently she is cochair of the '88 Women's Division Campaign in Atlanta. She also serves on the Executive Committee of the National Women's Division Board holding the Communications portfolio and

is on the Public Relations/Communications Committee of UJA.

Active in AIPAC and V.P. of the Peach PAC, Georgia Citizens for Good Government, she was actively involved in the recent election of Senator Wyche Fowler.

Since 1974 when she went to Israel on a Young Leadership Mission, there have been numerous visits to Israel with her Israeli husband, and with national Women's Division Missions. She has served on the State of Georgia Holocaust Commission since 1986. She has also visited Prague, Poland and will be in Romania this fall. Interested in helping young people to study in Israel, she serves on the Scholarship Committee of the Tel Aviv University Overseas Student Program.

Her knowledge and concern for her fellow Jews in the U.S., in Israel and in Europe, especially behind the Iron Curtain, made her presentation a treat for those attending this special luncheon.

Sara began working for and supporting Federation in Birmingham, Alabama — a direct result of having her dearest friend living in Israel for four years and married to an Israeli. According to Sara, "She educated me, got me involved and shared her experiences with me, firsthand. My path took a new direction."

Sara was born in Montgomery, Alabama, the eldest of three daughters. Their formative years revolved around a small Sephardic community whose members were family and part of the larger Jewish community of Montgomery. She is well aware of dealing with anti-Semitism and problems associated with integration in the deep south.

In Birmingham, while teaching at the newly formed Jewish Day School and assisting with a community campaign to build a new facility for the school, she learned the importance of Jewish education. Sara moved to Charlotte, as a single parent, without employment, and found herself on the receiving end. The Charlotte Jewish community took care of her and her son Mark and

made them a part of the community. After she and Mike were married, with his intense interest in the Middle East and her Birmingham experience, they moved toward involvement in the Charlotte Jewish Federation. She worked for 5½ years as a professional staff member in programming at the JCC. Sara worked for the Foundation for 2 years during its formative time and beginning of construction of Shalom Park.

In 1983, on a Young Leadership Mission to Israel, Sara was "hooked" forever. All that Federation does touches Sara, through family, friends or through being a Jew. For these reasons, she feels that volunteering for CJF is one of the most important things she does.
