'Dear Mom,

"When I was asked in my CI 2800 class to think about the person who has influenced me the most to go into teaching, the name that immediately popped in my head was yours. Other people have made an impact on my decision to teach, but no one more than you. I admire your teaching skills very much and respect you for what you
