Hundreds of North American Jews Demonstrate Solidarity with Israel on United Jewish Communities Capital-to-Capital Mission

The delegation - nearly 500 strong - departed November 13, flying from Washington, DC, at the close of the United Jewish Communities General Assembly meeting there, to Jerusalem, on the first national "Capital-to-Capital" Mission.

"All the participants and communities involved felt this was the time to come to Israel - in spite of and because of the events of September 11, and in spite of and because of what is happening as a result of the Palestinian intifada," Mission Chairman Larry Hochberg, a Board member of the Jewish United Fund/The Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago. "This was the time to come and show solidarity with the Israel, and Americans understood that and

By the end of this year, after a similar solidarity mission next month, close to 5,000 people will have traveled to Israel on UJC national and community missions since Israel entered its current conflict last year.

Michael Gelman, president of the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington and Capital-to-Capital Mission Co-Chairman, said it is critical for North American Jews to demonstrate their solidarity at a time when Israelis are feeling isolated and tourism and businesses are suffer-

"Both America and Israel are at war with terrorism," he said traveling to Israel on a solidarity mission, participants are signaling their support of what America is doing and what Israel is doing."

Participants on the Capital-to-Capital mission met with Israeli government, military and business leaders, ordinary Israeli citizens whose everyday lives have been affected by the continuing con-flict, and North Americans now living in Israel.

Jerusalem Mayor Ehud Olmert. who has been outspoken on the importance of North American solidarity missions to the psyche and economy of Israel, met with the delegation, as did Housing and Construction Minister Natan Sharansky, among others.

Mission participants visited the Israeli Defense Force's Hatzor Air Force Base, where military officers discussed Israeli and global terrorism. to Participants also visited residents of Seam Line communities around Jerusalem, such as Gilo, where residents are facing much hardship by living on the frontlines of the conflict.

Delegations from specific North American communities also visited their Partnership 2000 communities in Israel, For example, the Washington, DC delega-tion, visiting Beit Shemesh, joined Mayor Danny Vaknin for the dedication of Pentagon Park - built in memory of the victims of the September 11 terrorist attack of the Pentagon in Washington, DC

"It was very moving and every one was very touched," said Gelman. "It strengthened the part nership between our community and Beit Shemesh."

Solidarity missions mean a great deal to the people of Israel, who feel isolated and alone," said Robert Schrayer, chairman of the UJA Federation Campaign. Campaign. "Traveling to Israel gives North American Jews an unparalleled opportunity to reach out to them, to touch them, to feel their anxiety, yet also express North American unity with them and bring the message that they are not

In a strong sign of support and unity, nearly 900 North Americans traveled to Israel on a national UJC solidarity mission in January. And last month, 39 community members from the Greensboro Jewish federated community expressed their solidarity by trav

eling to Israel and meeting with residents and leaders, as did near-200 people from the Jewish Community Federation Cleveland.
