Laura is a student in the ALEPH (Alliance for Jewish Renewal) pro-

The class will explore the answers found in the mystical tradition (Kabbalah) to such questions as these: Who is God? How can we celebrate the divine nature? How do prayer, ethics, and passion help

Participants should have an acquaintance with Judaism and will be expected to read and dis-cuss a packet of short readings. The class will meet Shabbat mornings, 10:00 AM to noon, on February 2 and 23, March 2 and April 6 at the Kaplan home, 2900 Somerset Drive in Charlotte. A Kiddush (but not a

Forsan Hussein, a Palestinian citizen of Israel, was delighted to learn that he had received a scholarship to an American university because of his work in peace education for children. 
