First of all, let me extend heartfelt congratulations to Hal Levinson and to all who make our community great by their participation. Next, I would like to revisit some of Mitch Rifkin's comments about the "One for All Ball" and his misplaced disappointment.

Although the celebration was for a worthy cause, there are many worthy causes in our community. In the past year most of us have been touched in some way by the hurricanes, the war in Iraq and the call to support Israel in her time of need. We have rallied to the call and donated time, money and support over and over again.

Each individual has the responsibility of allocating his or her time, money and resources among causes they deem worthy. This responsibility is a wonderful part of our community and is the reason we have so many events and programs and are able to reach out to so many in need. Judging someone unfavorably because they do not or cannot attend a function that someone else deems "the event of the year" is not exactly a charitable attitude.

Not everyone has the same amount of discretionary income available to them, so please don't judge someone choosing instead to donate money to the Yom Kippur Appeal or the Israel Emergency Fund. The "mere" \$200 per person cost of the Ball, which is \$400 per couple, not to mention buying something decent to wear and possibly paying for a sitter, is more than the entire month's food budget for some families and therefore not by any means discretionary income.

Looking at the list of donated auction items, it is evident that not everyone was asked to participate. Are you aware of the Business and Professional Networking Group that meets twice a month to encourage Jews helping other Jews grow their businesses? Did it occur to anyone to come to a meeting and ask if a member would like to donate goods or services to help both support the fundraiser and their business?

We have many civic minded, charity conscious members of our community. They give behind the scenes and are never recognized for their contribution, which doesn't seem to dampen their spirit of giving. And that's a good thing, especially when they are chastised for not doing enough.
