Bob's Flag has brought a light of caring and the mitzvah of giving and receiving to three Jewish strangers bound together by an American Flag.

This is a story of three Temple Beth El members linked together by Bob's Flag, actually an American Flag. Rabbi Judy helped by giving Eileen Schwartz the initial introduction to the deployed SPC Ronald J. Boyd and then the path of the mitzvah really began.

The mitzvah path all started in November, when a story about Eileen Schwartz's visit to the White House appeared in the *Charlotte Observer*. Elly Miller read the story and had a thought, "Bob's Flag."

Bob Miller passed away a few years ago and the funeral home gave Elly Bob's Flag. Bob had served in the Army as a PFC, deployed to Japan. When Bob passed away, he did not have a military burial, however the funeral home had a flag for Bob. So, Elly took it.

with the flag, so it stayed packed away in her home, still respectfully folded in a triangle. Elly gave the flag to Eileen to mail to SPC Boyd.

Now the story takes on a little twist ... Boyd works in Mortuary Affairs. Bob's Flag was sent to Iraq and now the flag is displayed there with great honor and enormous feeling for his entire unit at Mortuary Affairs.

When SPC Boyd comes home from his deployment the flag will follow. It will be put on display at Temple Beth El and rest there awhile until we locate another deployed soldier who would honor us all with taking the flag.

This story is not complete without some words from Elly Miller and SPC Boyd.

"Please tell Mrs. Miller thank

you for the flag. It is an honor to display it here. It was a somber moment when we placed the flag into the mortuary, just the fact of where it came from and what it represents here. Many of the soldiers that will come into its presence will not be able to see it, however, their memory and the memory of Bob will always be with all of us," says Boyd.

Elly Miller said, "I received the flag in honor of Bob's status as a veteran. I wanted to find an appropriate way to use it and when I read about the Flags Across the Nation Program I knew I had found the answer. I also knew Bob would have been pleased to have his flag used this way."

We're all sure Bob is smiling.

A thought from Rabbi Judy, "Mystics teach that every Mitzvah we do brings light into the world. What a great Mitzvah to share among three strangers."

He is the publisher and co-owner of Torah Aura Productions and Alef Design Group, which publishes numerous texts: including all the Hebrew texts used by Temple Israel Religious School. Grishaver is a prolific author and has written more than one hundred books including *Shema is for Real* and *Forty Things You Can Do to Save the Jewish People*. Mr. Grishaver is a dynamic and inspiring speaker and teacher.

Joel Lurie Grishaver will be speaking on: "The Mechanics of Jewish Values" (Saturday Shabbat Service).

Joel Grishaver has degrees from Boston University and the

University of Chicago. He has pursued graduate studies at the Hebrew Union College and the University of Southern California. His real education comes from working with Jewish day camps, summer camps, children's museums and youth groups; and from teaching in Hebrew schools, day schools, Hebrew high schools, and graduate schools. He is a founding board member of the Coalition for the Advancement of Jewish Education, a consultant to the Whizin Institute for Jewish Family Life, and a faculty member of the Department of Continuing Education of the University of Judaism. More than twenty weekends a year, Joel teaches Jewish learners of all ages as a Scholar-in-Residence in communities all over North America and Europe.

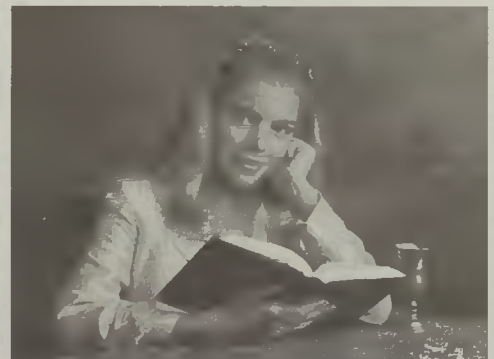
