

## **Youth Visions**

#### **Teen Freedom Riders from** DC Visit Charlotte

A delegation of 31 black and Jewish high school students from Operation Understanding DC arrived in Charlotte on Wednesday, July 11, as they travel on their month-long summer jour-ney to see places of importance to the African American and Jewish communities.

The students 15 African Americans and 16 Jews - met with community activists and 1960 sit-in leaders B.B. DeLaine and J. Charles Jones; toured the Levine Museum of the New South; learned about Charlotte's Jewish community from Temple Beth El Executive Director Sara Schreibman; and explored the Shalom Park campus.

The 31 students from Washington, DC are part of Operation Understanding DC (OUDC), a decade-old educational leadership development program whose mission is as simple as it is vital: "Positive race relations require our moving beyond tolerance to truly embracing diversity," says Rachael

Executive Feldman, Director of OUDC

Before reaching Charlotte, the students and four group leaders explored New York City and Greensboro, NC From Charlotte, they will travel by bus to 11 cities in 4 states including Atlanta and Clayton, GA; Birmingham, Montgomery, and Selma, AL; Meridian, Jackson,

and the Mississippi Delta; and Memphis. The group will return to DC on Sunday, July 29.

Joey Blum, a 17-year-old from Bethesda, MD, was happy to join the group because his parents were involved in the civil rights movment of the 1960s. "My goal is learn more about that period of our country's history," he said.
"How are our African-


American and Jewish communities connected and similar?" wondered Lavon Sampson, a 16-year old from Upper Marlboro, MD.

The whole trip has been eye-opening for the entire group. "We visitied the mosque that Malcolm X led," said 16-year-old Bianca Davies. The Silver Spring, MD resident said, "That was the most moving part of our trip."
