Every year, Post Confirmation takes a trip to Washington, DC, where they take part in Jewish leadership conferences. In these conferences, students learn how to be an active part of a progressive society. At the same time, Panim guides students in applying Jewish values to the actions that they chose to take.

Another great program, the David Project, is taught every other year to Hebrew High juniors and seniors. The David Project is essentially a series of curricula that train Jewish youth to be effec-
