A new, best selling novel is our selection to kick off the next Temple Israel Book Club season on Tuesday, September 25. Michael Chabon, Pulitzer Prize winning author of The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier & Clay has written another "blockbuster." The Yiddish Policemen's Union is a very good, larger than life folk tale" set in the Alaskan panhandle town of Sitka - a safe haven for Jews, created in the wave of the Holocaust and the shocking 1948 collapse of the fledgling state of Israel. A mixture of alternate history and murder mystery, Chabon's new novel sets up "a classic genre construction as the catalyst for extended investigation into a way of life. Issues of exile and belonging, of identity, nationality, free-dom and destiny are examined."
