Beth El Offers Innovative "Thank God It's Shabbat" Services

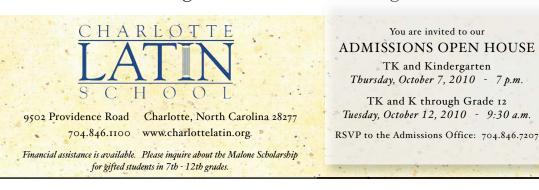
