From 7-9 PM, Rabbi David Powers will enlighten his students with "Jewish Thought Part III: Responsa Literature." Responsa literature is composed of answers by rabbis to questions of Jewish law and practice that come from other rabbis and from lay people. Through the course, adult learners will examine traditional and classical responsa from centuries of Jewish life, look at the unique responsa of the Shoah (the

Holocaust), and devote the final class to the responsa literature of North American Reform Judaism.

The spring minimester elective course "The Reform Jewish Approach to Death and Dying," will be taught by Rabbi Judy Schindler from 8-9 PM. The sages of Judaism teach us to always be prepared for our final day on this earth. Elective course participants will reflect upon this inevitable

journey of life as they explore end of life decisions from those surrounding medical choices to writing ethical wills to end of life rituals such as *tahara* (ritual washing) and burial.
