NEW 2013 IMPACT FUND GRANTEES

The Jewish Federation's Community Impact Fund grants are intended to inspire individuals, organizations, synagogues, and agencies to provide innovative and impactful engagement opportunities for the greater Charlotte Jewish community.

Ballantyne Jewish Center: Provide residents of the Sun City community Jewish programming to foster a deeper sense of pride and appreciation of their Jewish heritage.	\$5,500
The Butterfly Project: Create videotapes of stories of local Holocaust survivors to use in the Butterfly Project workshops, and provide enhanced volunteer training.	\$10,000
Charlotte Jewish Film Festival: Develop a mobile app to engage and attract young audiences.	\$2,000
Consolidated High School of Jewish Studies: Expand a Hebrew class providing Hebrew High students foreign language credit at their public & private high schools.	\$3,000
Florence Melton School of Adult Jewish Learning: Support the hiring of a part-time Melton Director to insure the long-term growth and continuity of this impactful Jewish literary curriculum.	\$15,000
JAFI/JFGC - Israel at 65: Create a full year of Israel engagement programming for the Charlotte community in celebration of Israel at 65.	\$13,400
Jewish Educational Loan Fund: Provide interest-free loans to Charlotte area college students.	\$2,000
