Schloss Summer Lecture at Temple Beth El

Marathon bombing, the community is asking many questions about security, on one hand, and civil liberties, on the other. Following Friday evening Summer Shabbat Services on July 12, Temple Beth El's eighth annual Schloss Summer Lecture will address the questions: "What freedoms do I need to give up to be safe? What safeties do I need to give up to be free?"
