A New Community Emerges

As Charlotte's Jewish community continues to grow and expand, so too does its constituent congregations. Recently, it was announced that a new community would be forming under the name

of Congregation Kehillat Charlotte, a trans-denominational congregation that is taking a new approach to Judaism in Charlotte. "The name Kehillat Charlotte is indicative of what we hope to become as a community; reaching out to everyone and especially reaching out to those Jews who are unaffiliated. We want to create an intimate Jewish prayer experience, a place where peoples' spirituality is nurtured and cared for, and a place where everyone is made to feel welcomed and included," said Rabbi Richard Chizever, who is helping to organize and lead the fledgling congregation.

Chizever, a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York, has served congregations all over the southeastern
