JCRC Fall Lecture October 23 Deborah E. Lipstadt on the Rising Anti-Semitism in Europe

The Jewish Federation of Greater Charlotte's Community Relations Council (JCRC) welcomes Dr. Deborah Lipsdadt to Charlotte on Thursday, October 23, 7 PM in the Sam Lerner Center for Cultural Arts at Shalom Park. Dr. Lipstadt will discuss emerging contemporary manifestations of anti-Semitism, particularly in Europe.

Dr. Deborah Lipstadt is the Dorot Professor of Modern Jewish and Holocaust Studies at Emory University in Atlanta. In addition to authoring several books about the Holocaust, Lipsdtadt was a historical consultant to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, and has served as an advisor to former Secretary of State Madeline Albright on matters of religious persecution abroad. She has appeared on CNN, CBS's "Sixty Minutes," NBC's "Today Show," and is a frequent contributor to numerous national newspapers. Lipstadt was a consultant to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. In 1994, she was appointed by Bill Clinton to the United States Holocaust Memorial Council, on which she served two terms as a member of its Executive Committee and chaired the Educational

Committee and Academic Committee. Dr. Lipstadt has been called upon by members of the United States Congress to consult on political responses to Holocaust denial.

She has received numerous teaching awards including Emory's student government association's award for being the teacher most likely to motivate students to learn about new and unfamiliar topics and the Emory Williams award, for her courses on modern Jewish and Holocaust studies.

Headlines tell the story daily: Professional footballers Ray Rice and Greg Hardy convicted of domestic violence. President Obama announces that dating violence at college campuses is reaching epidemic proportions. Statistics show that some form of abuse exists in one in three teen relationships and in one in four homes.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and since 2009, 19 Jewish agencies in Charlotte have banded together to

recognize this important cause. Once again this year, these agencies are actively encouraging all of us to take a visible stand against domestic abuse in our Jewish community and to follow the Jewish values of en-

suring justice and helping those in need. Silence, standing still and misinformation perpetrate abuse.

In spite of the agencies' efforts, fewer people in our Jewish community are coming forward today to ask for help. "Victims often avoid speaking out beca

avoid speaking out because they believe they are alone, are ashamed or are afraid that others will judge them," explains Stephanie Starr, Execu-

Stephanie Starr, Executive Director of Jewish Family Services. "Domestic violence is about power and control by the abuser and that's why it's important that our community work together to support the victim so he or she feels

safe in knowing that coming forward will lead to positive changes," says Starr.

Sue Worrel, Executive Director of the Jewish Federation (which helped underwrite the initial campaign in 2009) wholeheartedly

agrees. "Creating a safe haven is the job of the entire Jewish community," says Worrel. "Whether it is a member of a Temple, the Jewish Community Center, a young adult at Moishe House, or a senior attending Oasis, a victim of abuse should feel believed, accepted, cared for, and protected going to anyone in our agencies," says Worrel. "It is no easy task, but we are committed to making that happen."
