You may know that certain

types of cancer are more common among Jewish people than in the general population. You may also know that finding certain genetic risk factors can be helpful in figuring out if you personally are at increased risk. We invite you to attend a free educational event to learn more about these issues and to hear from experts in the field.

Angelina Jolie recently was in the news because she had surgery to prevent breast cancer after she learned that her family history of breast cancer was due to their having the BRCA genetic mutation. BRCA-1&2 mutations occur in only about one out of every 300-800 people, but in Ashkenazi Jewish people, it is much more common – one in 40 carry this gene. Inheriting either gene increases a woman's lifetime risk of developing breast cancer to 65-74%, according to the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology. The risk of getting ovarian cancer is also higher than in people without these mutations, 39-46% for those who have BRCA-1 and 12-20% for BRCA-2. Genetic testing is the first step in both cancer prevention and early detection.

Speaking at the event, which will be held in Gorelick Hall on June 3 from 7-9 PM, will be Katya Lezin, R. Wendel Naumann, MD, and Teri Howell,

RN. It will be hosted by the Charlotte Chapter of Hadassah, by the Jewish Community Center, and Myriad Genetic Laboratories.

Katya Lezin lives in Charlotte, is a columnist for the Charlotte Ob-

server, and was diagnosed in 2011 with ovarian cancer related to her having the BRCA-1 genetic mutation. She says that she "now travels the country as a patient advocate and survivor, speaking to ... anyone who will listen to her account of the upside of being BRCA-1 positive and being a cancer survivor." Katya has written a memoir entitled "But I Just Grew Out My Bangs - A Cancer Tale," and she will be signing books at the end of her talk.

R. Wendel Naumann, MD is currently the Director of Minimally Invasive Surgery in Gynecologic Oncology and Professor in the Department of Ob/Gyn at the Levine Cancer Center at Carolinas Medical Center in Charlotte, North Carolina. Current
