What the Victory or Defeat of Germany Means to Every American

The victory of Germany means the substitution of the pernicious principles of "Might Makes Right" and "The End Justifies the Means" for the just, equitable, and hardly-won prescriptions of International Law. That Law would have to be rewritten in the terms of German Kultur. We can imagine the precepts of the new code from the practices of the Germans: arson entitled to rank among the virtues, devastation and rape would become a praiseworthy action; destruction among the fine arts; piracy and poisoning would be exalted, and Hell would take the place of Heaven, with the so-called German God in Satan's place.

The Divine Right of Kings would flourish at the expense of the Rights Divine of Men. The inhabitants of the world would be divided into two classes—Germans, and all others; Rulers, and Ruled. And so soon as the Ruled could safely measure arms with the Rulers, the war would begin again, and continue unendingly until but one class remained—Germans, or all others.

The victory of the Allies means the triumph of democracy; that is, of law, order, decency, morality, and international altruism.
