Two 6600 kilowatts, ninety revolutions or minute, General Electric generators, 3,200 volts, will be installed now, with the usual auxiliary apparatus; while a paird will be installed later. The water-heels are, of course, of the vertical ope, and the generator and water-wheel ill be on the same shaft. Current will be transmitted to Badin without the use transformers, to the rotary converters Building 35, where it will be conserted to direct current for use in the otrooms.

At the present time, there have been aced about seventy-five thousand cubic ards of concrete in the dam and power-puse, leaving about seven thousand abic yards still to be placed.

The closures in the gate openings are by being made, and will be completed December. Steelwork on the powerouse has been started, and is progressing nicely.


