Judge Garrett, builder of seven lines and prince of story tellers, is spending a month at the Massena Works, where his experience in sanitary construction will be used to good account.

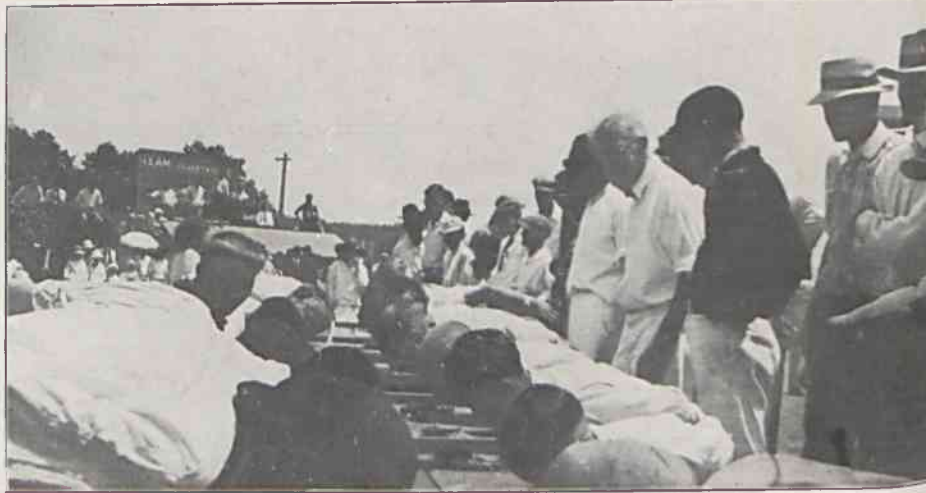
