" 1 -To put aside as their first obligation, and before they spend it all, part of their incomes for future use.
" 2 -To invest the money they save out of their incomes in a security which pays a reasonable rate of interest, and is absolutely safe-United States Government securities.
" 3 -To use the rest of their incomes so as to make every penny they spend buy something they really need and want, and which has a full penny's value.
"4-To use what they buy with their money with as much care as if it were money itself."

They have believed in Badin from the start, and are going to make several other improvements in the near future. Mr. G. N. Trexler came to Badin in 1916, and is in charge of the telephone department of the company here.
