Clear Aisleways Important

Carelessly leaving Carbon butts scattered on the floors and in the aisles of the Pot Rooms is the cause of another accident. On March 24 No. 1883 stepped on a piece of old carbon butt which had been thrown in the aisle near No. 2 Section, causing him to fall striking his knee against the concrete floor and receiving a painful injury which caused him to lose two days' time. Such accidents as this are unnecessary and could easily be avoided if every man when replacing burned carbons for new ones would give a little thought to the danger he was causing himself and fellow workmen by throwing old carbons and rods on the floor instead of dropping them in the cans provided for that purpose.

Failure to maintain clear aisleways through shops and departments has caused hundreds of serious accidents and will continue to form a part of industry's casualty record so long as the Foreman and men do not fully appreciate the necessity of proper aisleways. Wherever material is handled by trucking, clear aisleways become doubly important, not only for the greater safety they provide, but also because they actually speed up production. Help keep the aisleways clear in your department and watch for a decrease in accidents, and an increase in production.
