We wish them much success in the future.

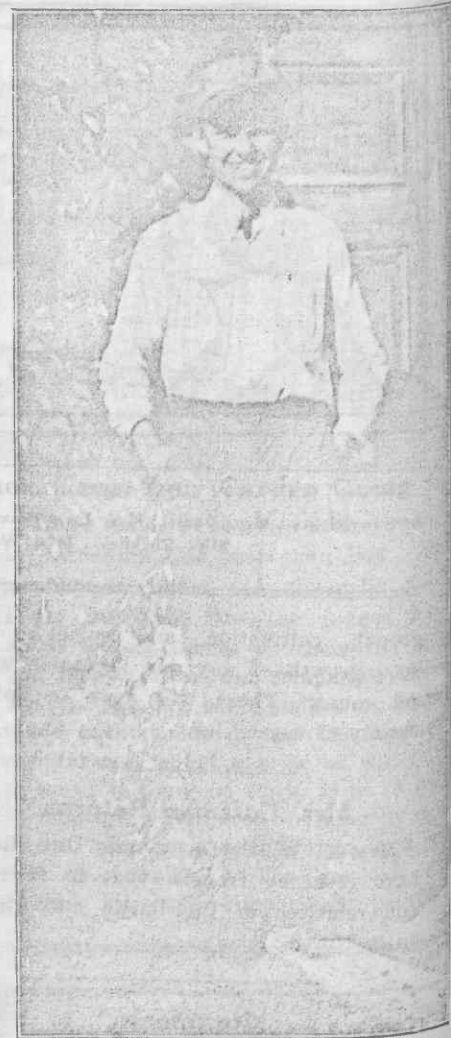
