In 1896, he obtained, after considerable effort, his first real job—the position of Principal Assistant Engineer with the Lake Superior Power Company, at Sault Ste. Marie.

It is possible that James Rickey did not know much more about engineering than the average bright young man who has had good training in a first-rate technical school—he does not admit that he knew as much as that. However, the important point is this; what he did not actually know he more than made up by strict application to work and hard study at night. He "put it across."

In 1897, Mr. Rickey went with the St. Anthony Falls Waterpower Com-

pany, Minneapolis, as Assistant Engineer, and remained with that company until June, 1907, at which time he came to the Aluminum Company of America.
