

## Former Temple Stars in 'Buster Lineup vs. Owls

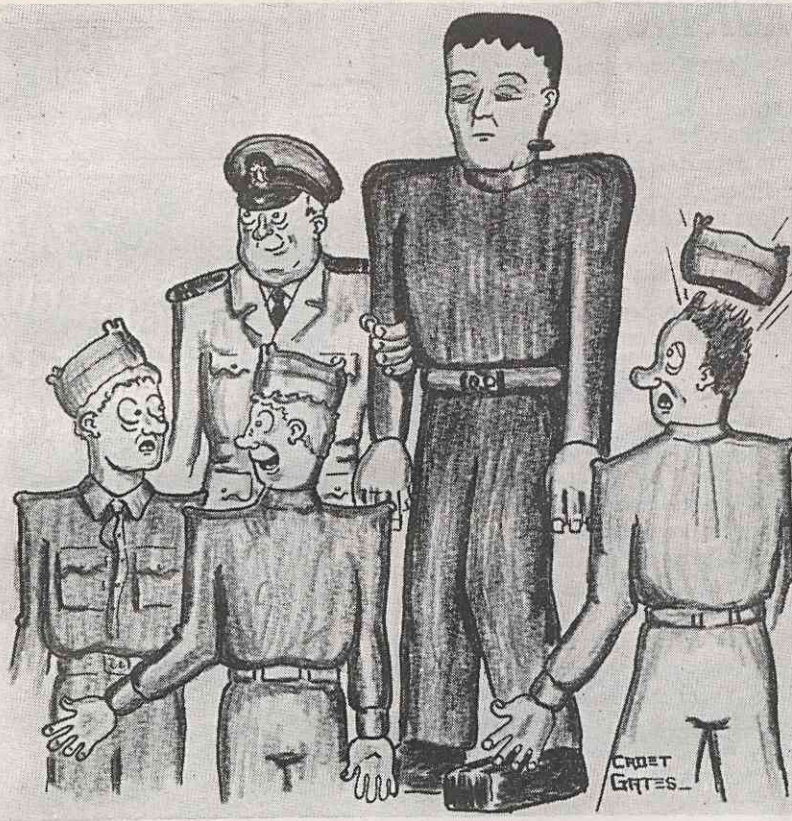
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 23—Philadelphia football fans who lead the nation in attendance at games played here by Temple and the University of Pennsylvania, will see three former Temple stars in action tonight with the Navy Pre-Flight School's Cloubusters from Chapel Hill against the Owls.

The visiting cadets are Right End Frank Moister, Right Tackle Allan Sturges and Left Guard Joe Boyd—and each is determined to out-do the other in administering blocks and tackles to the huskies representing their alma mater. Sturges and Moister, playing side by side in defending against the power bucks, are in for a tough evening. The Owl line, averaging some 210 pounds per man, has yet to be pushed around the field and can, at times, open large holes for its backs.

Last week the Owls made the long trip to Dallas, Tex., where they were held to a 6 to 6 tie by an aroused Southern Methodist eleven.

Leading the Owl attack is the 210-pound fullback, George Sutch, a line-smasher who has yet to be stopped this season when vital yardage was needed.

The weight chart reveals the visitors will be out-weighted some 10 pounds per man—which means Lieut. Comdr. Jim Crowley's running attack, paced by Cadet Walter Zwiezynski and Ca-

det Joe Martin, will have more than a few barriers barring its path tonight. The Cloubuster head coach indicated today he would send John Witkowski in at left end to start the game with Steve Hudacek at left tackle and Charles Pierce at right guard. Joe Kovach will start at center.

Performing at quarterback will be

another lad Philly fans have seen more than a few times in years past. He is Gene Davis, 190-pounder, who captained the University of Pennsylvania team last season. Martin, who is expected to match Sutch yard for yard, will be the starting fullback with Len Eshmont and Zwiezynski manning the halfbacks.

The loss to Boston College last week was the first for the Cloubusters this season and came as the result of a 25-yard pass and a 35-yard run. The Navy scored when Hudacek blocked a punt and Witkowski fell on the ball in the Boston College end zone for the six points. The kick for conversion was missed, thus giving the Eagles their 1-point advantage when the final gun sounded.

The Cloubusters had defeated Catawba College, 13-2; Harvard, 13-0; North Carolina State, 19-7, and played the Georgia Navy to a 14-all tie before getting bumped by Boston College, the top team in the East.

## Beebusters Make Home Debut Against Camp Davis Today

Today, on the Kenan Stadium turf, the Cloubuster "B" team makes its home debut against a tough Army squad from Camp Davis. The game will start at 1430.

The B squad opened its season last Saturday by running over Guilford College, 46 to 0, but can't afford to rest on its laurels in today's clash. Camp Davis, using the line-busting "Wild Bill" Gallagher to lead its attack, has exhibited power in four games and should prove a worthy foe.

The Army squad is coached by Capt. H. A. Johnson who played under Lieut. Comdr. Jim Crowley at Michigan State College and later assisted him with the Spartan squad. Matching wits with Capt. Johnson will be another of Crowley's former pupils—Lieut. (jg) N. J. Pierce, one of the famous "Seven Blocks of Granite" at Fordham. Assisting Pierce is Ens. Dick Cassiano, former great back for the Pittsburg Panthers during the Jock Sutherland regime.

Camp Davis lost its opener, 0 to 32, to The Citadel, then played Appalachian State to a 13-13 tie, dropped a 14-21 contest to the air-minded Catawba Indians and whipped High Point, 20 to 0.

With the varsity Cloubusters in Philadelphia and all the Big Five conference teams on foreign soil, the game today looms as the outstanding gridiron attraction for North Carolina fans. The ivy-covered rivalry between the Army and the Navy should flourish in force.

Gallagher is expected to carry the offensive burden for the visitors and stopping him is a job the Navy tacklers may find difficult. The 205-pound fullback was a star with Niles Kinnick on Dr. Eddie Anderson's fine Iowa university elevens of a few years ago. Directing the team's play will be Lieut. Ed Holloway, former star at Temple university, who is an expert blocker and does most of the passing.

Standouts in the line include John Mellus, All-America tackle from Vil-

anova and a pair of ace ends, Joe Sesselman and Dick Bruce. Joe is a former New Jersey Golden Gloves champion—which should be fair warning to the Navy blockers who go after him.

Coach Pierce yesterday named Lane and Ellis at ends; Forbes and McAvoy, tackles; Gandley and McGahan, guards; and Miller, center, to start in the line. The Beebuster backfield will consist of Emerson, quarterback; Santin, left halfback; Keuffel, right halfback; and Franks, fullback.

Prior to the kickoff the cadet corps will march on the field in formation and proceed to their seats in the stadium. The band will provide music and may perform during the halftime intermission.

## 'Buster Booters Face High Point

Fresh from a 3-0 victory over Duke, the Pre-Flight soccer team is geared to topple a strong eleven representing High Point, in the game to be played today at 1530 on the drill field.

Lieut. Earle C. Waters' system of play, stressing an unusual type of attack and defense, is working out to his satisfaction as the players become more familiar with it. Defensively the Cloubusters depend upon Knoeckel, Steen, Tondorf, Kleckner, and the stalwart goal play of Hoffman and McGee.

If the team lives up to the promise evidenced in parts of their initial contest last week, it will have a good chance of chalking up a second victory.
