Vindicators Win Sports Program

That's just about the approximate amount that the swimming department of the Chapel Hill Navy Pre-Flight School has given away in free lessons to non-swimmer cadets in little over a year.

At least, Lieut. John Miller, USNR, head pre-flight coach and former Mercersburg academy mentor, figures it that way.

"Since the start of the naval aviation physical fitness program here May 23, 1942, well over 1,216 cadets who couldn't swim a lick on entering now have been taught to be at home in the water.

"In civilian life swimming instruction for beginners runs \$2.00 a lesson. At that rate, taking the number 1,216—multiplying it by instruction given at \$2 per head, the Navy here alone has provided over a hundred-thousand dollars worth of water education to nonswimmers.

"Actually, of course, the monetary angle is just a sidelight. The important thing is that 1,216 future naval fliers have been taught to swim, starting from scratch. Someday this knowledge may save their lives.
