armored divisions in the Wehrmacht on the Russian front. The backbone of these Panzer units is now the sixty-ton Mark VI "Tiger" tank which carries an 88 mm. gun in its central turret.

These forces are formidable and their weight and strength are still ominous though the German High Command is now committed to a defensive strategy. It is true that on July 5 the Germans lunged forward in the Kursk salient in what at first appeared to be an advance on Voronezh. Their thrust is now believed to have been timed merely to upset an anticipated Russian offensive, which is now menacing Orel, key munitions manufacturing town and railroad center some 200 miles due south of Moscow.
