February's "Quality Problem" was with the Noblesville 210/3 fabric, TT216. We received a complaint from Noblesville when they found a drop ply (2 ply in a cord that should have 3 plys) in our fabric. They rejected the whole roll. We don't twist this cord in our plant; we buy it from Dixie Yarns here in Gastonia. We have started a procedure for more frequent inspection of the fabric and Dixie Yarns is working on the problem from their end.

All our own people in the industrial weaving area have worked hard on stopping the defect from getting out to Noblesville. Thanks, guys and gals!!
