

Flight Highlights Piedmont's First 737 Arrival Record

Definitely in the record breaking business, Piedmont's latest, and by no means least, accomplishment was setting the speed record for twinjet transports.

On the occasion of the delivery flight of the first Boeing 737, Piedmont flew a great circle route from drivers' seats, Seattle, Washington to Wilmington, North Carolina, a total Captain L. W. of 2,501 miles, in four hours and 47 minutes.

The average speed was 504 miles per hour and Sifford and riding Piedmont's newest jet landed at Wilmington with 6,300 jump seat, Boeing pounds of reserve fuel.

The first half of the flight was flown at an average altitude of 35,000 feet and 33,000 feet the last half.


Charles B. Cross, former Division Chief Flight Attendant for Norfolk and Knoxville, has been named Manager of Stewardess Training.
