WATERFALL CLAIMS LIFE OF THOMAS BOYER

Thomas Monroe Boyer, 12, of Holly-wood, Fla., who was exploring Horse Cove Falls with a friend, lost his footing on wet moss and was swept over the falls 150 feet to his death.

The accident occurred last Thursday when young Thomas and a grandson of Ed Edwards of Highlands went exploring around the falls. The Boyers had recently rented a cottage in Horse Cove and were on a vacation trip to Pittsburg, Pa.

The body was sent by Bryant Funeral Home to Hollywood for burial. Surviving are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Boyer; a sister, Nancy; and the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Anna Kolcum of Pittsburg.

NORTH CAROLINA GENERAL ASSEMBLY ENACTS UNIVERSITIES BILL

The North Carolina General Assembly has enacted legislation establishing a regional system of universities from the mountains to the coast.

Two of the four state supported senior colleges forming the initial framework of the new university system are located in the Western North Carolina mountains.

They are Western Carolina College at Cullowhee and Appalachian State Teachers College at Boone

The other two--one in the Piedmont and the other in the east--are A & T College at Greensboro and East Carolina College at Greenville.

The legislation elevating the four colleges to university status went into effect July 2nd.

The regional system move was initiated by supporters of university status for East Carolina College whose first effort earlier in the session met defeat in the Senate.

Shortly after the regional universities bill was introduced as a new approach by backers, amendments were accepted to include Western Carolina College and Appalachian State Teachers College.
