

**LOCALS WIN RAGGED AFFAIR.**

**FULGHUM SCORES HALF OF TEAMS 50 POINTS; WHITLEY SHOWS UP WELL FOR TIME HE WAS IN THE GAME.**

Wilson, N. C.—The "Little Christians" won a ragged affair from the Goldsboro "Ramblers" Thursday night, February the 10th. Whitley's showing for the time he was in the game was the outstanding feature. The "Ramblers" had a team of stars.

The blue and white broke the scoring ice a few seconds after the contest was under way when Fulghum sank a pretty shot from the side of the court. This lead was not held long by the "Christians", for the entire Goldsboro team with the exception of Bullock sank a two pointer in rapid fire order. The Blue and White again found themselves and soon took the lead, but again the "Ramblers" would not be out done and came back with a spurt that swept the "Christians" off their feet. Half time found the "Little Christians" on the small end of the 20 to 15 score.

As the second half got under way the "Ramblers" continued their scoring spurt. At this stage the "Christians" passes were wild and long, and were continually broken up. The "Christians" called time out and talked things over, but when play was resumed it seemed as if their talk was in vain, for the "Ramblers" just could not miss a shot. The contest seemed as if it were a Goldsboro victory, but the "Christians" finally came with one point of tying the score. Then Goldsboro sank one from the middle of the court, giving them a three point lead. The crowd began to leave, but the "Fighting Christians" found themselves and started the fight that has characterized their play through the state. When the final whistle blew the "Christians" had amassed 50 points to 40 for the "Ramblers" making it the eighth consecutive game won.

**CHAMPS ARRIVE HOME.**

**RETURN WITH WINS OVER GUILFORD, CATAWBA, LENOIR-RHYNE, AND A. S. N. S.**

Wilson, N. C.—The "Little Christians" returned Saturday, February the 5th, from the most successful trip any team representing the school has ever attempted. By winning all four games they clinched the state championship of the "Little Five."

Leaving Wilson Monday morning, January 31st, the "Little Christians" encountered Guilford College at Guilford in the evening. Starting with a rush the "Christians" were never in danger during the entire game. Coach Doak's charges were not in it with the "Little Christians", who passed and shot baskets at will. The Quakers were unable during the entire contest to stop the short snappy passing of the "Christians." Although the "Quakers" fought hard they came out on the small end of the 39-25 score. This being the initial and encouraging game of the trip.

At Salisbury the "Christians" were encountering unknown material. Not knowing what Catawba had, they were worried until after the contest got under way. The large crowd that filled the gymnasium were expecting a "Catawba" victory, but as soon as the first whistle blew the "Christians" started—never to be headed or stopped. The crowd was still confident of a "Catawba" victory at half time, as the "Christians" were leading by just a small margin. But after Coach Walker finished his lecture at the intermission the "Christians" came back with a scoring spurt, that put them

out in the lead by ten points; and when the game ended the score stood 33-17 in favor of the "Little Christians."

The "Mountain Bears" of Lenoir-Rhyne, who defeated the string of a team on Wednesday night, were in the best of conditions for "The Little Christians" on Thursday night. The contest not even considered to be a good practice game for "The Bears". The gymnasium was packed, and all were confident of winning the game, and also the championship of "The Little Five." The first half was a hard fought affair with Lenoir-Rhyne taking the breaks. The "Christians" fought for every inch yet when the whistle ended the first half, the "Bears" were leading 15-11. The second half started with a rush, "The Bears" sinking four field goals, and at the middle of this period "The Bears" were leading by eleven points. The crowd knew that the game was won, but the "Christians" just wouldn't give up. In the last few minutes of play they hit their stride, and with three minutes left "The Christians" were leading by one point. "The Bears" called time out and talked things over, but their intermission was in vain. When play was resumed "The Christians" sank three field goals. Thus when the whistle blew "The Christians" were on the large end of the 34-28 score. With this game came the State championship, the first time the school has ever won the championship in any sport. The last game at Boone with A. S. N. S. was more of an endurance test for "The Little Christians" than anything else. After playing three games during the week and riding the majority of the time, they were in no condition whatever to play basketball. The result being they played a slow game, and were lucky to come out on the big end of the 27-18 score.
