The latest society to be organized on the campus, the S. O. S., has chosen Mrs. Edwath E. Yavorski for its sponsor.

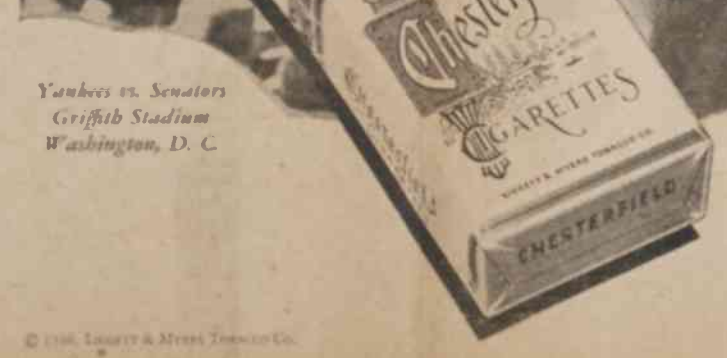
The S. O. S. is the first organization ever organized on the campus with scholarship as its chief aim.
