As chairman, Eugene Ogrodow ski, president of the Golden Knot, sketched the history of the society He further pointed out the two fold purpose of the organization to give recognition to those who have measured up to the ideals of the college and the society, and to Gives Freshmen develop and foster attitudes among the students that would make for the attainment of these ideals.

The organization's ideals o scholarship, service, character and leadership were discussed by two other members, Thelma Arner and Griffith Hamlin. It was pointed out that these ideals are absolute es sentials in real living. Character and constructive leadership ar needed both for college and worldrelations. Likewise, n scholarship is complete if the ideal of service is left out.

Dr. Jenkins, one of the faculty advisors of the group, concluded the Y. M.-Y. W. program by speaking on "The Values of Honor Societies in our American College Life.


