The Bulldogs played their best game of the season in losing to the out-played Pirates eleven.

ACC got off to a good start by scoring, without too much trouble in the first period. The Bulldogs were on a combination of running plays, and the bullet-like passes of Lefty Helmer to Sott and Zoll-coffer.

The final scoring play that put the Bulldogs in front came on a 20-yard pass from Helmer to the waiting arms of Bobby Stott. The conversion was good, and the Bulldogs led 7-0.

The Pirates refused to take it sitting down and came back fighting. After an exchange of kicks, one a 60-yard spiral by Helmer, the Pirates got their first break of the game.
