Noe Explains History

Preceding the ceremony, Marguerite Noe, president of the organization, explained the origin and basis of selection for membership into the Society.

In 1938, there existed at ACC an organization for women known as the Alpha Delta Chi Honor Society. There was also a newly formed group known as the Men's Honor Group. These two organizations joined hands to form what is now known as the Golden Knot Honor Society. It is the only existing honor society on the campus of the college at the present time.

It was in 1938 that the newly formed organization held its first tapping service and it has since been an annual event. "It is with the prospect of serving the school and the student body that these outstanding students were tapped this morning," said the president.

The scene is the home of Tamp Rice in a little fishing village on Pamlico Sound in Eastern North Carolina late on a winter afternoon. The characters are composites of people Mayo came to know while living in Pamlico County.

Mayo's play displays beautiful characterization and smooth dialogue. It is a realistic picture of the sea-coast village and the heart-warming lives of its population.

Lives In Pamlico

Mayo is a native of Pamlico County. He has been enrolled at ACC for the past three years and is majoring in English. Although he has been affiliated with the Stage and Script Club for three years, this is his first work as an author. The talent of this young author was apparent last Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

"The Black Sheep" took honors along with "Disturb Not The Dead" in the Hill play-writing contest, but since only one play could be selected from each school. Consequently "Disturb Not The Dead" won out.

"Disturb Not The Dead," directed by Marguerite Noe, deals with the removal of an American body from France. The setting is laid in an American military cemetery. It is the absorbing story of two women and their clash over the soldier's body.

Clean Voting
