#### Three Girls, Four Boys Are Named To Honor Publication

Seven student leaders at Atlantic Christian College will be included in the publication "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges" for 1951-1952.

This publication, issued annually, contains biographical sketches of outstanding students from colleges and universities throughout the nation.

Selections are made on the basis of excellence and sincerity in scholarship, leadership and participation in extracurricular and academic activities, citizenship and service to the school, and promise of future usefulness to business and society.

Three girls and four boys have been selected to represent Atlantic Christian in the current volume. They are Virginia Hauser, Audrey Jones, Opal Roberson, Fred Boyce, James J. (Jay) Clark, Marshall Long, and Herbert Ross.

Virginia Hauser from Winston-Salem is an English major. She is president of the Stage and Script and performed in several productions in her school career. She is Feature Editor for the COLLEGIATE, and a marshall.

From Snow Hill comes Audrey Jones, a primary major. Last year she received the Water's Religious Cup which is awarded annually to the most conscientious worker in religious affairs on the campus.

She is an officer in the Student Christian Association and the Phi Sigma Tau Sorority. She is on the chapel committee, member of the Future Teachers of America and previously was on the Women's Dormitory Council.

Opal Roberson is a native of Washington, N. C. She was national secretary of Sigma Pi Alpha, national honorary language fraternity last year.
