(Editor's note: The following item was published in the Harvard Alumni Bulletin. Richard D. Fay, of the faculty of Mass. Inst. of Technology, recently translated Lincoln's Gettysburg address from its classic English prose into typical UN Jargon.)

THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS
