Small And Caminos Appointed To Plan ACC's "New Look"

The campus building program has been placed in the hands of G. Milton Small, A. I. A. Raleigh architect, and Professor H. Caminos, head of the School of Architecture of North Carolina State College. The appointments were made by the Board of Trustees of Atlantic Christian College and the Building Committee, composed of President Travis A. White, Russell Arnold, James M. Moudy, Milton Adams, and Charles Cobb.

During the past summer in joint meetings of the Board and the Committee it was decided that a new type of architecture would be desirable in the future construction of buildings on the campus.

Considerations

In order to obtain the most functional and usable space per construction dollar, many considerations were made. The members of the committee felt that contemporary structures which reflected the spirit of our time would serve as best background against which to educate young people.

A number of well-known architectural firms were considered and the advice of the members of School of Design at N. C. State College was sought.

At the second meeting toward the latter part of the summer, information about the various firms was brought before the Board. At this meeting it was recommended that the college employ a partnership composed of Mr. Small and Mr. Caminos.

The recommendation included an over-all campus plan which would project the needs of the college. It was voted unanimously to put these two gentlemen under contract.

Mr. Small

Mr. Small, who was born in Oklahoma, received the highest grade ever obtained by any person on that state's examination for state license in architecture. Having much experience as overseer in large construction projects for other architectural firms, he worked for Perkins and Will, nationally known school building designers. It was he who designed the Nuclear Reactor Building, which is on the campus of North Carolina State College.

Mr. Caminos

Mr. Caminos received his early training in Argentina. After receiving a traveling scholarship to the United States, he returned to Argentina, where he won a scholarship to England and another one to the United States. He decided to accept the position of Head of the School of Architecture at N. C. State College with the intentions of becoming a United States citizen. His reputation rests mainly on work which he did when he was

Tables Are Here

Thirty-four shining new tables will henceforth grace the Bert Hardy Dining Hall and 204 new chairs are now on order. The order for both tables and chairs was placed with the Southern Desk Company in Hickory. The formica-top tables are 30" x 72 inches.

The flags, measuring 4 by 5 1/2 feet, are equipped to serve both for parade and for display.
