

RE Message Is Impressive

 Religious Emphasis Week, which was observed October 11 through 15, was a big success in all respects — especially the chapel messages. The theme "Man's Search for Himself" was well carried out by the Rev. Beverly Asbury, from the First Baptist Church in Zebulon, who conducted the morning worship services. Mr. Asbury's messages were centered around "faith," because it is faith that encourages man to find himself, or rather find God. Mr. Asbury stated that man needs to be able to change, choose, grow, and to find God in his own way.

He further stated that the dogmas and traditions of the church are no longer as crucial as they were in the past. He also said that the people of today were torn between stability on one hand and conformity on the other. Politics have become authoritarian beliefs. Morals are rigid attitudes of good and bad, and the churches are both fundamental and liberalistic. The reason for many people turning to Communism, he stated, is that "religion has failed to fill the vacuum in their lives." People crave security and are afraid of change; therefore the key note of our day is not action but reaction. Mr. Asbury said that the people are retreating into the past and that most had rather be satisfied than to search for sainthood. Man has a sense for security rather than a response to service.

Mr. Asbury left us with these questions concerning religion:
 1. Do we want it enough to learn from the past?
 2. Do we want it enough to change the traditional church?
 3. Do we want it enough to free men from cages of hate?
 If so, then, by the grace of God, we can get it.
