Campus Building Progresses; Architects Present Master Plan

Science Building Is Taking Shape

The superintendent of the construction gang now working on our new science building, was kind enough Wednesday afternoon to let me go over the blueprints in his office. I spent the entire afternoon browsing through those drawings, looking over the designs for floors, ceilings, walls, staircases, doors, and a dozen other components of the building.

The building, which we hope will be ready for use next fall, is to be of two stories, with nine classrooms, two laboratories, five offices, men and women's lounges, a greenhouse, and adequate closets and storage rooms. It is to be 75 feet, 5 inches by 142 feet, 10 inches, with reinforced brick walls, asphalt-tile floors, acoustical plaster ceilings, and banded built-up roof.

The construction of the building is coming along very well. The first-story walls are almost completed and the reinforcements for the second floor are being riveted in place. Plumbing is rising from the ground and emerging from half-finished walls. The bricklayers are working rapidly now, as the building takes shape.

Yes, we will have a science building. And barring weather interruptions of Hazel's type, or other such catastrophe, it will be completed on schedule.

Work On Buildings Starts This Summer

Architects have presented a very attractive master plan for the future development of the campus, and plans are now on the drawing board for a new classroom building. This building, which will include twenty-four classrooms and numerous faculty offices, will be built into the center of the campus. It will feature a raised terrace which will extend from the building into the area now occupied by Kinsey. The building will be extremely modern, with two stories, a flat roof, and lots of glass. The administration unit will be separate from the class room building and will face Lee Street. The administration building will contain administrative offices and a faculty lounge. Both new buildings are to be begun in late summer.

It was very encouraging to hear that most of the trees on campus which we are so proud of will be saved.

Everyone has been noticing and admiring the new science building, which is being constructed. A period of bad weather slowed up the work for a while, but now that the weather is more favorable, rapid advancement is being made. However, the administration reports that it is doubtful that it will be ready for use in September.

It's a shame that the seniors won't get to enjoy all the new buildings on campus, but it will be heart-warming to look at them with pride and know that we're graduates of such a wonderful institution which has shown unbelievable progress the past few years.
