The superintendent of the construction gang now working on our new s c i e n e e building was kind enough Wednesday afternoon to let me go over the blueprints in his office. I spent the entire afternoon browsing through those drawings, looking over the designs for floors, ceilings, walls, staircases, doors, and a dozen other components of the building.

The building which we have will

The building, which we hope will be ready for use next fall, is to be of two stories, with nine classrooms, two laboratories, five offices, men and women's lounges, a greenhouse, and adequate closets and storage rooms. It is to be 75 feet, 5 inches by 142 feet, 10 inches, with reinforced brick walls, asphalttlle floors, acoustical plaster cellings, and bunded built-up roof.

The construction of the building is coming along very well. The first-story walls are almost completed and the reinforcements for the second floor are being riveted in place. Plumbing is rising from the ground and emerging from half-finished wells. The bricklayers are working rapidly now, as the building takes shape.
