Cast Of Fall Play Starts Rehearsals

Stage and Script Club has chosen the cast for the fall play, MEDEA, adapted by Robinson Jeffers from the Greek version by Euripides. The play is to be given in Howard Chapel on Thursday and Friday evenings, November 10 and 11, at 8:15 P. M. The cast contains several members who have appeared before with notable success on our stage, and some newcomers who show promise of becoming "Stars." The title role, Medea, will be played by Evelyn Yionoulis, who starred last year in BELL, BOOK AND CANDLE and THE CRUCIBLE. Evelyn is playing the role of the barbaric princess with fervor and abandon. Her husband, Jason, famed in mythology for his capture of the golden fleece, is played by Jimmie Burnette, known on campus for his performances in IDIOT'S DELIGHT, in THE CRUCIBLE, and in OUTWARD BOUND with the summer group.

Oliver Rand will portray Creon, the king of Corinth, and Richard Etheridge will play Aegus, the kindly nobleman from Athens. Oliver acted with Stage and Script for several years before he entered the service, playing in AS YOU LIKE IT, ROMEO AND JULIET, ELIZABETH THE QUEEN, and BLITHE SPIRIT. He holds a Stage and Script key as well as a letter. We

are glad he has returned to our stage. Richard made his debut as the irrepressible Nicky in BELL, BOOK AND CANDLE.

The sympathetic part of the Nurse will be played by Ellen Dennis, who played more youthful parts last year; the women of Corinth are Betty Jean Outlaw, Emily Moore, and Mary Eva Griffin. Harry Forbes is the Tutor and Bill Boswell, a newcomer from Texas, is Jason's slave. Betty Britt Perkins and Sheila Aycock will be Medea's attendants; Deltan Glover, Luther Deason, and Clifton Hedgepeth will be soldiers.

Rehearsals for the play are underway, with the cast showing great promise in the difficult and strenuous presentation of characters which have been acted in the past by many great actors. In the New York production in 1947, Judith Anderson played Medea and John Gielgud played Jason.
