## Capital Journalist Analyzes Presidents

Douglass Cater, Washington editor of the reporter, spoke on the subject of the American presidency in chapel March 7. He was sponsored by the Concert and Assembly committee and introduced by Mrs. Hugh Johnston.

Mr. Cater discussed the requirements of a good president, the presidency itself, and the ideals set by Americans for their chief. He stressed the importance of a strong president and analyzed the terms of Roosevelt, Truman, and Eisenhower in the light of their probable influence in American history.

A regular observer of the White House, Mr. Cater has held many governmental positions besides his journalistic work. He has traveled extensively in Europe and has made several trips behind the Iron Curtain while studying the Communist philosophy.

Following his chapel lecture, Mr. Cater spoke to several classes.

## Greensboro Rabbi Speaks In Chapel

Rabbi Frederick Rupins of Temple Emanuel, Greensboro, was guest speaker in an observance of National Brotherhood Week in Howard Chapel, February 24. Sponsored by the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods, he was introduced by H. C. Hilliard, Jr.

Rabbi Rupins spoke on the responsibility and privilege of being an American, and stressed the idea of brotherhood as an American principle. In explaining the meaning of brotherhood, he said that we must "treat each other fairly" and "encourage others." Prejudices are against the principles of our "great American brotherhood," which was established by early settlers.

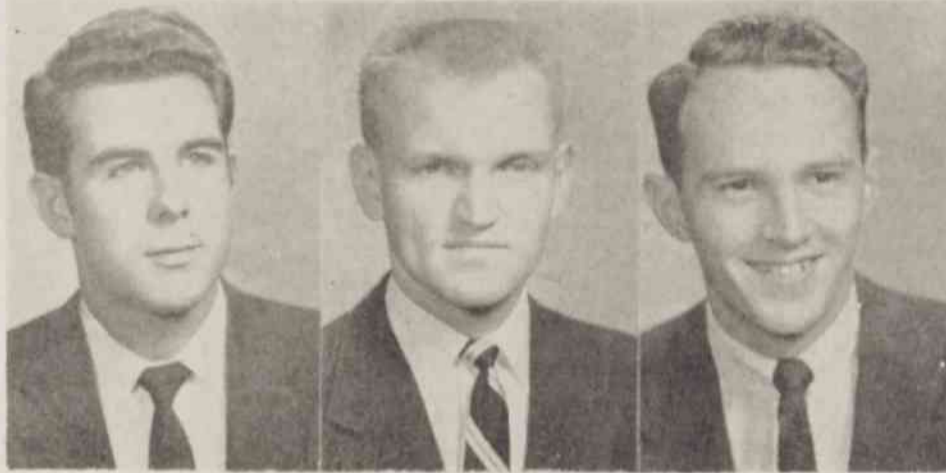

## Rouse, Hester, Hutchins Contest For Presidency

### Speakers Announce Platforms

Platforms for the presidential candidates were presented in chapel on March 16. Campaign managers were Blackie Jones for Kenneth Rouse, George Willoughby for Chuck Hester, and Tommy Williamson for Charles Hutchins.

Blackie Jones gave a brief sketch of Kenneth Rouse's qualifications and experience. He then introduced his candidate who declared that, if elected, he would do his best to uphold the students' interests. He defended his recent stands in controversial campus issues, and further stated that he had no desire to win a "popularity contest," but felt the office worthy of an honest appraisal.

George Willoughby, in speaking for Chuck Hester, outlined his qualifications for the office of president.

He declared that the students had shown their faith in Chuck's ability on former occasions by electing him to important campus offices. After the introduction of their candidate, Hester supporters waved banners and tossed bubble-gum to give the chapel a real convention atmosphere.

Campaigners for Charles Hutchins marched down the center aisle to the tune of "Dixie". Jim Burnett spoke in behalf of Hutchins and then introduced his candidate, who stated briefly his proposals for the office. He said that he wished to serve the best interests of the students with actions rather than words. A final move of his supporters was another rendition of "Dixie" to which the entire chapel rose in confederate loyalty.

### Other Positions To Be Filled Later

Three candidates are seeking election as president of Atlantic Christian's Student Cooperative Association. They are Kenneth Rouse, a junior from Kinston, Charles Hester, a junior from Greensboro, and Charles Hutchins, a junior from Winston-Salem.

The presidential campaigns were held in Howard Chapel on March 16. The election will take place on Friday, March 23. Following the election of a president of the association, other officers will be nominated and elected.

**Rouse**  
Kenneth Rouse, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude M. Rouse of Kinston, is currently serving as president of Sigma Kappa Phi Fraternity here at ACC and is a former vice-president of the North Carolina Christian Youth Fellowship. A graduate of Wheat Swamp High School in Lenoir County, he was president of three of his four classes while in high school. He is now president of the junior class and is seeking a degree in English and religion.

**Hester**  
Charles Hester, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Hester of Greensboro, is a graduate of Greensboro High School and is seeking a degree in mathematics and business administration. He is, at present, treasurer of the student government and has served as secretary-treasurer of the Men's Dormitory Council and treasurer of Sigma Alpha Fraternity. He is a member of both the college basketball and tennis teams.

**Hutchins**  
Charles Hutchins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl T. Hutchins of Winston-Salem, is a member of Phi Kappa Alpha Fraternity and is now serving as treasurer of the organization. He is a forward on the varsity basketball team, participates in track, and is a member of the college band. A graduate of Mineral Springs High School, he is majoring in mathematics and minoring in physical education.

Betty Jean Outlaw also a student of the college played three piano Etudes by Chopin.
