Two faculty members at Atlan-tic Christian College will become acting department heads on Feb-ruary 1, it was announced by Pres-ident Wenger. Allen K. Sharp will become act-ing chairman of the Department of Religion and Philosophy, and G. A. Constantine will become acting chairman of the Department of Religion and Psychology. Mr. Sharp succeeds Dr. James M. Moudy, who is leaving to be-come dean of the Graduate School of Texas Christian University. Dr. Moudy has served as chairman of the religion department as well as dean of instruction. Mr. Constant ine succeeds Dr. Randall B. Cut-lip, who is resignation. A native of Covingdon, Ky., Mr. Allen H. Sharp will become acting ing chairman of the Department of Religion and Philosophy, and G. A. Constantine will become acting chairman of the Department of Education and Psychology. Mr. Sharp succeeds Dr. James M. Moudy, who is leaving to be-come dean of the Graduate School of Texas Christian University. Dr. Moudy has served as chairman of the religion department as well as dean of instruction. Mr. Constan-tine succeeds Dr. Randall B. Cut-lip, who is relinquishing his dutter as chairman of the duttes as dean of the College since Dr. Moudy's resignation. M. Sharp has served as associate pro-fessor of Religion and Philosophy at Atlantic Christian College for three years. He attended Lynch-burg college and received his A.B. degree from Transylvania. He also holds the B.D. degree from the college of the Bible, Lexington, Ky, Before joining the faculty at At lantic Christian, he served as min-ister of the Wendell Christian church.

By ART BISHOP Effective February 1, 1957, there will be a change in the present administrative system. This change has been brought about by the re-signation of Dean of Instruction. Dr. James M. Moudy, who is leav-ing to become dean of the Grad-uate School of Texas Christian University. University.

University. The present system, set up under the presidency of Dr. Travis A. White in 1955, consists of five main divisions. These divisions are Di-vision of Business Affairs, Division of College Growth and Develop-ment, Division of Alumal Affairs and Student Recruitment, Division of Instruction, and the Division of Student Life. All of these divisions are responsible to the president of the college, who in turn is respon-sible to the Board of Trustees. The change in this administra-

shile to the Board of Trustess. The change in this administra-tive system will involve only the Division of Instruction and Division of Student Life. The other divisions will stay the same. The Division of Instruction and Division of Stu-dent Life will become one division under the head of the dean of the College. The dean of the College will be Dr. Randall B. Cullip, with Dr. J. P. Tyndall as assistant dean. dean

#### **Accepts** Position As Graduate Head At Texas Christian U.

Dr. James M. Moody, dean of instruction at Atlantic Christian College, has resigned to accept the post of dean of the Graduate School at Texas Christian Univer-aity. He will begin his duties at that institution on February 1. Dr. R. B. Cullip has been chosen for the post vacated by Dr. Moody. Dr. Moody has been at Atlantic Christian since the fall of 1953. He came from Duke University, where he had recently finished his work for the Ph.D. degree. While a t Duke he compiled one of the best records in the history of the grad-uate school. He majored in church history. history.

While at ACC, he has served as head of the Department of Religion and Philosophy as well as dean of instruction. Dr. Moudy has also taught a number of religion courses each semester.

Dr. Moudy will be returning to his native state and to the school in which he did his undergraduate and seminary study. He received both his A.B. and B.D. degrees from T.C.U. His wife also is a native Texan. As dean of the Graduate School

As dean of the Graduate School, Dr. Moudy will be in charge of all graduate instruction with the exception of the seminary, Brite College of the Bible. He will also teach some courses in religion at the undergraduate level.

He was in charge of the measures undertaken by Atlantic Christian in successfully meeting requirementa for accreditation in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secon-dary Schools. When asked what development at ACC gave him the most sutafac-tion since he has been here, Dr. Moudy replied that although the accreditation was the most pleas-ed with the faculty growth and progress.
