Dr. Cutlip Chosen Dean Of College

Dr. Randall B. Cutlip, dean of student life here at ACC, has recently accepted an appointment to serve as dean of the college for the spring semester. Dr. Arthur D. Wenger, president of ACC, earlier announced that Dr. Cutlip will continue to carry out the duties of dean of the student life program at the college in addition to the duties previously handled by Dr. James M. Moudy.

A native of North Carolina, and former dean of men and chairman of the Department of Education, Dr. Cutlip has served as dean of student life at the college during the last two academic years. He came to ACC from the University of Houston where he was a member of the faculty in the Department of Education.

Dr. Cutlip received his bachelor of arts degree from Bethany college in West Virginia, his master of arts from East Texas State and his doctorate in education from Houston.

He is a member of the Alpha Sigma Phi, national social fraternity; Phi Delta Kappa, professional society in education; Kappa Delta educational honor society; South Texas Counselors Association; Southern Personnel Counselors Association, and American Personnel and Guidance Association.

Dr. Cutlip has constantly proved himself a valuable asset to the recent expansion program at ACC. His wise counseling and sincere interest in the college students have won him their respect. Under his capable leadership the college can look for continued growth throughout the approaching spring semester.

Accepts Position As Graduate Head At Texas Christian U.

Dr. James M. Moudy, dean of instruction at Atlantic Christian College, has resigned to accept the post of dean of the Graduate School at Texas Christian University. He will begin his duties at that institution on February 1. Dr. R. B. Cutlip has been chosen for the post vacated by Dr. Moudy.

Dr. Moudy has been at Atlantic Christian since the fall of 1953. He came from Duke University, where he had recently finished his work for the Ph.D. degree. While at Duke he compiled one of the best records in the history of the graduate school. He majored in church history.

While at ACC, he has served as head of the Department of Religion and Philosophy as well as dean of instruction. Dr. Moudy has also taught a number of religion courses each semester.

Dr. Moudy will be returning to his native state and to the school in which he did his undergraduate and seminary study. He received both his A.B. and B.D. degrees from T.C.U. His wife also is a native Texan.

As dean of the Graduate School, Dr. Moudy will be in charge of all graduate instruction with the exception of the seminary, Bible College of the Bible. He will also teach some courses in religion at the undergraduate level.

Many major developments have occurred on the ACC campus during Dr. Moudy's tenure here. He was in charge of the measures undertaken by Atlantic Christian in successfully meeting requirements for accreditation in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Considerable progress has been made in enrollment and building facilities also.

When asked what development at ACC gave him the most satisfaction since he has been here, Dr. Moudy replied that although the accreditation was the most dramatic, he was probably most pleased with the faculty growth and progress. "I only hope to enjoy my new job as much as I have enjoyed this one," said Dr. Moudy.

Acting Department Heads Named

Two faculty members at Atlantic Christian College will become acting department heads on February 1, it was announced by President Wenger.

Allen H. Sharp will become acting chairman of the Department of Religion and Philosophy, and G. A. Constantine will become acting chairman of the Department of Education and Psychology.

Mr. Sharp succeeds Dr. James M. Moudy, who is leaving to become dean of the Graduate School of Texas Christian University. Dr. Moudy has served as chairman of the religion department as well as dean of instruction. Mr. Constantine succeeds Dr. Randall B. Cutlip, who is relinquishing his duties as chairman of the education department to assume the duties as dean of the College since Dr. Moudy's resignation.

A native of Covington, Ky., Mr. Sharp has served as associate professor of Religion and Philosophy at Atlantic Christian College for three years. He attended Lynchburg college and received his A.B. degree from Transylvania. He also holds the B.D. degree from the College of the Bible, Lexington, Ky. Before joining the faculty at Atlantic Christian, he served as minister of the Wendell Christian church.

He is married to the former Miss Glyn High of Wilson, who is an Atlantic Christian graduate. They have one daughter, Cindy. Mr. Sharp is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis and the National Association of Biblical Instructors.

Mr. Constantine is a native of Harvey, North Dakota, although he lived for many years in Chicago, Ill. After attending De Paul University, he received his A.B. degree from Atlantic Christian College in 1950. He also holds the M. A. degree from East Carolina College. Beginning his work on his doctorate at Northwestern University, he later transferred to Duke University, where he has completed his residence for the Doctorate of Education degree.

Before joining the Atlantic Christian faculty two years ago, Mr. Constantine served as principal of the Franklinton City Schools. He is married to the former Miss Julia Giarms of Wilson, who also is a graduate of Atlantic Christian. They have two daughters, Marilyn and Andrea.

In addition to his teaching duties in the Department of Education and Psychology, Mr. Constantine has been serving as co-ordinator of student teaching and served last year as director of teacher placement.

2 Divisions Put Under One Head

Effective February 1, 1957, there will be a change in the present administrative system. This change has been brought about by the resignation of Dean of Instruction, Dr. James M. Moudy, who is leaving to become dean of the Graduate School of Texas Christian University.

The present system, set up under the presidency of Dr. Travis A. White in 1955, consists of five main divisions. These divisions are Division of Business Affairs, Division of College Growth and Development, Division of Alumni Affairs and Student Recruitment, Division of Instruction, and the Division of Student Life. All of these divisions are responsible to the president of the college, who in turn is responsible to the Board of Trustees.

The change in this administrative system will involve only the Division of Instruction and Division of Student Life. The other divisions will stay the same. The Division of Instruction and Division of Student Life will become one division under the head of the dean of the College. The dean of the College will be Dr. Randall B. Cutlip, with Dr. J. P. Tyndall as assistant dean.

Both the dean of women and the dean of men and the entire faculty will come under this division. Also all previous matters coming under the Division of Instruction and Division of Student Life will now come under the Office of the Dean of the College.

Students Travel To South Europe

NEW YORK, N.Y. December 8, 1956 -- Europe-bound students from the Mid-West, South and West showed a gain of 19 per cent during the past three years, boosting their representation to 57 per cent of all U. S. students traveling abroad under the auspices of the Council on Student Travel, a non-profit organization. A Council survey shows that last summer only 43 per cent of the 7,000 boys and girls booking passage through the Council came from the North East, while the other regions of the country supplied 57 per cent. Three years ago only 38 per cent came from regions other than the North-East.

"We welcome this trend to wider geographical representation in student travel," said John E. Bowman Executive Director of the Council. "This past summer students from 47 states and 25 countries sailed together under the auspices of the Council's educational and religious member agencies."
