A few years ago the college had a master landscaping plan drawn for the campus. Working within the master plan the senior class has completed one phase of the program.

The planting of trees around the perimeter of the main campus and along the covered walkway on the inside court was the project

undertaken by the class.

Trees have now been planted in the designated spots on the master landscaping plan. Ginn said the class purchased a total of 50 trees. Forty of the trees are Dogwoods. Seven are Crepe Myrtle, and three are Eastern Red Buds.

Ginn said the cost of the project totaled about !250. The college added a few trees to complete the tree planting phase of the landscaping plan.
