In Wednesday's balloting, Smith totaled 231 votes and Riley compiled 193. Kenneth Bryan, current Treasurer of the Cooperative Association, ran third with 188 votes and Bob Matthews received 28

There was sentiment expressed that the results of the first balloting were largely due to the speeches delivered by the candidates Tuesday morning. In the speeches Smith and Riley both called for changes in the current form of government which would strengthen student government.

Plan For Dividing Smith detailed a plan for dividing the present Executive Board into two houses, one for the faculty members and another for the student representatives. Riley spoke of the 'New Deal' that has


