At mid-semester they begin full-day student teaching in the public schools for a period of nine weeks. While teaching in the public schools, student teachers perform the duties of regular full-time faculty which includes attending regular teacher meetings, P.T.A. meetings and other school activities.

The block system is being used for the first time by ACC student teachers in the elementary schools.
