## Shakespeare's Romeo & Juliet Ending Tonight

Performances of *Romeo and Juliet* at 3:30 p.m. and at 8:15 p.m. today will bring to a close the first North Carolina Shakespeare Festival which has been held on the campus of Atlantic Christian. These performances will be the culmination of a series of events which began on Wednesday and which included an address by Dr. Henry Popkin, noted Drama authority, on Shakespeare in Howard Chapel yesterday at 4 p.m.

Today has been designated as High School Day on the festival program and more than 700 high school students from the eastern section of North Carolina will be present at the afternoon program. At 2:00 p.m. there will be a special program deal-

ing with Elizabethan music held on the Campus Quadrangle at which time the Atlantic Christian College music department will present Elizabethan songs, followed by an exhibition of Sword dancing by Cherylyn Arnold and H. I. Tharrington. A special feature of this program will be the appearance of Forrest Covington, one of North Carolina's leading folk singers, who will sing a varied selection of Elizabethan folk music including ballads, love and patter songs. Mr. Covington is a resident of Burlington and has appeared on television and radio and has been a featured artist at many folk music festivals throughout the South.

The musical program will be followed by a matinee performance of *Romeo and Juliet* at 3:30 p.m. The festival association extends an invitation to all A.C.C. students to attend the musical event, but requests that they attend the evening performance of the play in order to assure ample seating for our guests.

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## College Prep Course Offered This Summer

Atlantic Christian College is offering for the second year a well-balanced program for high school graduates who are planning to attend college or universities but feel the need for more adequate preparation.

The purpose of the program is to give students intensive instruction which provides the opportunity to improve those skills and techniques which experience indicates are areas of greatest weakness.

Instruction will be provided in English and mathematics. The program will provide students with an oppor-

tunity to learn better work and study habits, to participate in supervised study and supervised recreation and to gain an orientation to college life.

All courses will be on a non-credit basis and will be taught by college faculty. Remedial instruction will be available in areas of demonstrated deficiency.
